# 6.06.23.01 25 MARCH 2023 – STORM DAMAGE - DISASTER RECOVERY FUNDING ARRANGEMENTS

The State Government has announced that the Shires of Beverley and Brookton are eligible for assistance through the jointly funded Commonwealth-State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA). The Shires were impacted by an intense storm and associated flooding in late March this year and can now access disaster recovery funding.

Under these DRFA arrangements, assistance can be provided to eligible impacted individuals, small businesses, primary producers, state agencies and local governments. Assistance includes support for temporary living expenses, housing repairs, concessional loans for small businesses and farmers, freight subsidies and help for Councils to undertake emergency road repairs.

Staff are now able to prepare an application for recovery funding to the DRFA. This work will be completed by a contractor. Staff will investigate if there are any benefits in working with the Shire of Beverley.

With approval of this application, Council can commence the process of repairs, again by external contractors.

# 9.06.23.01 DISASTER ASSISTANCE FOR FLOOD-IMPACTED AREAS IN WESTERN AUSTRALIA'S WHEATBELT - MEDIA STATEMENT – 23 MAY 2023

Communities in Western Australia's central Wheatbelt region affected by an intense storm and associated flooding in late March this year can now access disaster recovery funding.

The shires of Beverley and Brookton are eligible for assistance through the jointly funded Commonwealth-State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA).

Under these arrangements, assistance can be provided to eligible impacted individuals, small businesses, primary producers, state agencies and local governments.

Assistance includes support for temporary living expenses, housing repairs, concessional loans for small businesses and farmers, freight subsidies and help for Councils to undertake emergency road repairs.

The storm brought persistent heavy rainfall, hail and wind causing flooding, debris and damage to roads and other assets across the impacted region.

Federal Minister for Emergency Management, Murray Watt, said the assistance would help communities quickly get back to normal.

"Many local roads were closed due to flooding or damage, which can be really disruptive to communities, particularly in the regions," Minister Watt said.

"This latest activation means the local council, business owners, farmers and individuals can now access support to help with the recovery process."

Western Australian Minister for Emergency Services, the Hon Stephen Dawson MLC, thanked all the agencies, local governments and community members who were involved in the response.

"I'd like to acknowledge the efforts of the government agencies, local governments and emergency service volunteers who worked together to ensure local communities were kept safe during this weather event," he said.

"Main Roads worked closely with the shires of Brookton and Beverley to coordinate the safe closure and reopening of impacted local roads and ensure the removal of debris and emergency road repairs were promptly carried out.

"The financial support announced today will assist the eligible Wheatbelt shires to cover the costs associated with removing debris and clean-up, as well as the repairs required to restore important local road networks."

# 9.06.23.03 \$38 MILLION IN FUNDING TO BOOST NATURAL DISASTER RECOVERY IN WA - MEDIA STATEMENT - 5 APRIL 2023

- Multi-million-dollar programs to ensure WA can recover and rebuild from natural disasters faster
- 70 full-time staff to form State's biggest recovery team
- Funding to aid community recovery in the Kimberley following ex-Tropical Cyclone Ellie

Western Australia's ability to respond to and recover from natural disasters will be strengthened with \$38.3 million set aside in the State Budget to fund WA's biggest-ever dedicated recovery team.

The funding recognises the increasing frequency and severity of natural disasters in WA, with flooding in the Kimberley, Severe Tropical Cyclone Seroja in the Mid-West and major bushfires in the Perth hills and regional WA in the past two years.

Emergency Services Minister Stephen Dawson today announced a \$24.9 million investment which will enhance the Department of Fire and Emergency Services' ability to provide support following a natural disaster. Twenty-nine permanent full-time positions will be created to establish a sustainable State recovery capability.

A further \$13.4 million has been committed to fund a taskforce which will manage and support recovery in the Kimberley in the wake of flooding caused by ex-Tropical Cyclone Ellie.

This funding will employ 20 full-time staff for two years while a further 12 full-time staff will be employed for 12 months.

#### **Comments attributed to Emergency Services Minister Stephen Dawson:**

"This significant increase in resources from the McGowan Government will provide the biggest dedicated recovery team Western Australia has ever had.

"It will enable DFES to meet the increased demand for State recovery by having more people on the ground, which will help communities recover and rebuild faster.

"The State Government is committed to making sure communities are flexible and resilient, making it easier for them to bounce back and recover from these devastating weather events."

# 9.06.23.03 INDEPENDENT REVIEW UNDERWAY TO STREAMLINE NATIONAL DISASTER RECOVERY FUNDING – MEDIA STATEMENT – 3 FEBRUARY 2023

Emergency Services Minister Stephen Dawson has welcomed the Commonwealth's decision to commission an independent review into Australia's Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA) to ensure the scheme meets the expectations of Western Australians.

The review - led by former National Bushfire Recovery Agency head Andrew Colvin APM OAM - will determine the strengths and weaknesses of the current system to help bolster WA's resilience to hazards like bushfires, cyclones or floods.

Communities recently impacted by disasters will be encouraged to have their say on what did and didn't work in accessing recovery funding through the current arrangements.

DRFA provides a range of practical assistance measures to support communities through the challenging recovery period.

State Governments are responsible for administering the DRFA assistance measures, with the Commonwealth reimbursing the State for up to 75 per cent of eligible costs.

Expected to be completed by 2024, the review seeks to address recommendations from the 2021 Royal Commission into National Natural Disaster Arrangements.

The Royal Commission recommended a review of the DRFA to help identify roadblocks to applying and help streamline processes that slow down recovery payments.

Supporting continual efforts to improve WA's emergency management capabilities, the review will also examine what is needed to build Australia's resilience to an increasing number of extreme disaster events.

Several WA-led projects are already underway to strengthen the State's resilience to disasters including the establishment of a State Disaster Recovery working group, implementing a Community Disaster Resilience Strategy and developing an improvement plan for Local Emergency Management Arrangements.

## **Comments attributed to Emergency Services Minister Stephen Dawson:**

"Disaster recovery is a complex and challenging process - everyone's recovery journey is different.

"This review is an important step forward in identifying what the State and Commonwealth can do to create a more efficient and simplified recovery funding model that works for all Australians.

"In many cases, the work has already started on several important projects that are set to have a major impact on the way our State manages disaster recovery.

"I thank Minister Watt for listening to concerns brought by the State Government and commissioning this review."
